IEP 101— Common Terms

As special education teachers, we sit in case conferences with you, the parents and guardians, and use words that we try our best to explain to you, but maybe we didn't do the best job, or you forgot. The following are some of the terms we use in conferences, their abbreviations, and a short explanation.

Individualized Education
Program (IEP) is a written
document that is developed,
reviewed, and revised by
the CCC describing how the
student will access the general education curriculum
(if appropriate) and the
special education and related services to be provided.

Teacher of Record (TOR) refers to the Special Education teacher who is in charge of writing your student's' IEP and keeping track of their progress.

<u>General Education Teacher</u> (<u>Gen Ed</u>) refers to the student's grade level teacher.

Case Conference Committee (CCC) is a group made of school staff and the student's parents that is responsible for deciding the student's eligibility for special education and other services and developing and reviewing the student's individualized education program (IEP).

Why Inclusion?

Many years ago students who received special education support were often taken to a classroom at the back of the building and kept away from their gen ed peers. This is no longer the case. For the past few years, North Montgomery special education teachers have pushed into the gen ed

classrooms to support students with IEPs. This is called inclusion. Now the students with IEPs are included in the gen ed classrooms. This allows students with IEP's to spend more time with their gen ed peers and receive the same teaching. The special services staff pushes into each

Least Restrictive Environment (LRE) refers to the amount of time a student is in the general education classroom versus the special education classroom. The goal is to keep the student in the general education room as much as possible; to give the student just enough support from special education staff in order to make progress, but not so little support that the student doesn't make progress.
